

## Presentation Guidelines

### Submissions and Presentation Format for Thematic Papers

Participants presenting papers in thematic panels are kindly asked to submit their **full papers by October 31** to [latampolmeth@gmail.com](mailto:latampolmeth@gmail.com). This will allow fellow participants and discussants sufficient time to review the material in advance. The presentation format for participants in thematic panels is entirely flexible and left to the presenters' preference.

#### Paper Sessions (Workshop Format – 60 minutes)

- Participants are expected to read the papers in advance and come prepared to discuss.
- Each session begins with a short introduction by the author (2–5 minutes).
- The assigned discussant will provide comments for 10–15 minutes.
- The remaining time will be devoted to Q&A and open discussion with the audience.

#### Panel Sessions (11:15–12:30 – 75 minutes)

- Each presenter has up to 12 minutes for their presentation.
- The discussant will comment on both papers for a maximum of 15 minutes.
- The rest of the session will be allocated to Q&A and open discussion with the audience.

### Submissions and Presentation Format for Posters

Poster presenters are not required to circulate their work prior to the conference.

Posters should be printed in **B1 format (100 cm height × 70 cm width), in vertical orientation**. This size fits the available wooden stands (1.15 m × 0.78 m) and allows a comfortable margin for mounting.

A good poster presentation provides a clear and concise overview of your research. Below we share some guidelines adapted from the **Population Association of America (PAA)** to help you plan your poster:

- **Poster boards measure: this information will be available in the upcoming updated version of the program on the website.**
- Several software tools can be used to design posters, from Canva to PowerPoint. What matters most is ensuring the correct dimensions.
- In terms of content, aim for the equivalent of **12–15 presentation slides**.
- Avoid including excessive text. A poster is an invitation to read the article, not the article itself. We recommend fewer than **250 words in total**.
- Large tables are not advisable. Instead, summarize your key results rather than presenting dense or oversized tables.
- Try to avoid acronyms, jargon, and abbreviations. Feedback from past conferences has emphasized that these often create unnecessary barriers for new and international participants.
- Consider including **figures and images**. Graphics are highly effective in attracting attention and highlighting your main points.

### Weather

While Santiago can be quite warm in November (with average highs around 25.3 °C / 77.5 °F and lows near 9 °C / 48.2 °F), Viña del Mar remains milder, ranging from highs of about 21 °C / 70 °F to lows of 11 °C / 52 °F. Evenings can feel chilly, especially when it's windy.

### Security

For your safety, we recommend avoiding isolated areas, especially at night, and keeping your belongings close to you at all times. Do not display valuables or electronics in public, and use reliable transportation such as official taxis or ride-hailing apps. Be particularly attentive in crowded places, and avoid leaving items unattended. In case of theft, do not resist and report the incident to the police (Carabineros) and to us!
